## A BILL

- To support efforts of the governments of Western Hemisphere countries to increase the diversity of their upstream supply chains and downstream supply chains.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

## **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Semiconductor Supply
- 5 Chain Security and Diversification Act of 2024".

## 6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

7 In this Act—

1	(1) the term "upstream supply chain" includes
2	mining, production, or processing of critical minerals
3	used in semiconductor manufacturing, including—
4	(A) zinc;
5	(B) gallium;
6	(C) germanium;
7	(D) silicon;
8	(E) lithium; and
9	(F) cobalt; and
10	(2) the term "downstream supply chain" in-
11	cludes—
12	(A) testing and packaging facilities for
13	semiconductors; and
14	(B) advanced testing and packaging facili-
15	ties for semiconductors.
16	SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS; STATEMENT OF POLICY.
17	(a) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of congress
18	that the United States has an economic and national secu-
19	rity interest in diversifying the semiconductor supply
20	chain, specifically by encouraging the development of a re-
21	gionally-based semiconductor ecosystems in the Western
22	Hemisphere to compliment the investments in the United
23	States under the CHIPS and Science Act.
24	(b) STATEMENT OF POLICY.—It is the policy of the
25	United States—

1 (1) to promote the security of allies and part-2 ners of the United States by encouraging the devel-3 opment of accessible, transparent, competitive, and 4 robust semiconductor markets that provide diversi-5 fied sources, types, and parts of the semiconductor 6 chip; and

7 (2) to encourage United States public and pri8 vate sector investment in Latin American semicon9 ductor infrastructure projects to bridge the gap be10 tween national security needs and commercial de11 mand in a way that is consistent with the region's
12 absorptive capacity.

13 SEC. 4. SUPPORTING EFFORTS OF THE GOVERNMENTS OF

14WESTERN HEMISPHERE COUNTRIES TO IN-15CREASE THE DIVERSITY OF THEIR UP-16STREAM SUPPLY CHAINS AND DOWNSTREAM17SUPPLY CHAINS.

(a) IN GENERAL.—In carrying out the policy described in section 3(b), the Secretary of State, in consultation with the Secretary of Commerce and the heads of
other relevant United States agencies, shall, as appropriate, focus the efforts of the Department of State and
those agencies in supporting the efforts of the governments of Western Hemisphere countries to increase the

diversity of their upstream supply chains and downstream
 supply chains, including through—
 (1) providing diplomatic and political gupport to

3	(1) providing diplomatic and political support to
4	the Organization of American States and Western
5	Hemisphere governments, as necessary—
6	(A) to facilitate international negotiations
7	concerning cross-border infrastructure;
8	(B) to enhance the Western Hemisphere's
9	regulatory environment with respect to semi-
10	conductors; and
11	(C) to develop accessible, transparent, and
12	competitive supply chain markets and down-
13	stream supply chain markets that are supplied
14	by diverse sources, types, and routes of energy;
15	and
16	(2) providing support to improve Western

Hemisphere upstream supply chains and downstream supply chains for semiconductors, including—

20 (A) to diversify the sources and supply
21 routes of Western Hemisphere countries; and
22 (B) to enhance semiconductor market inte23 gration across the regions.

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(b) TERMS AND CONDITIONS.—For the purposes of
 providing support for projects under this section, the fol lowing terms and conditions shall apply:

4 (1) The United States International Develop5 ment Finance Corporation may provide support for
6 upstream supply chain and downstream supply chain
7 projects in countries in the Western Hemisphere
8 with upper-middle-income economies or high-income
9 economies (as those terms are defined by the World
10 Bank).

(2) The restrictions under section 1412(c)(2) of
the Better Utilization of Investments Leading to Development Act of 2018 (22 U.S.C. 9612(c)(2)) shall
not apply.

(3) The Corporation shall restrict the provision
of such support in a country described in paragraph
(1) unless—

(A) the President certifies to the appropriate congressional committees that such support furthers the national economic or foreign
policy interests of the United States; and
(B) such support is—
(i) designed to produce significant developmental outcomes or provide develop-

1	mental benefits to the poorest population
2	of that country; or
3	(ii) necessary to preempt or counter

efforts by a strategic competitor of the
United States to secure significant political
or economic leverage or acquire national
security-sensitive technologies or infrastructure in a country that is an ally or
partner of the United States.

(c) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEES DEFINED.—In this section, the term "appropriate congressional committees" has the meaning given that term in
section 1402 of the Better Utilization of Investments
Leading to Development Act of 2018 (22 U.S.C. 9601).
