# A BILL

  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Heat Management As5 sistance Grant Act of 2024" or the "HMAG Act of 2024".

#### 1 SEC. 2. MITIGATION OF EXTREME HEAT EVENTS.

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—Title IV of the Robert T. Stafford
3 Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C.
4 5170 et seq.) is amended by adding at the end the fol5 lowing:

#### 6 "SEC. 431. MITIGATION OF EXTREME HEAT EVENTS.

7 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The President, acting through
8 the Regional Administrator of Federal Emergency Man9 agement Agency, may provide assistance, including
10 grants, equipment, supplies, and personnel, to any State
11 or local government for the mitigation, and management
12 of an extreme heat event.

13 "(b) COORDINATION.—In providing assistance under
14 this section, the President shall coordinate with the head
15 of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

16 "(c) ELIGIBILITY.—To be eligible for assistance
17 under this section, a State or local government shall sub18 mit to the President—

"(1) an assessment of the potential loss of life
due to the extreme heat event based on information
on previous events, if such events have occurred;

"(2) an assessment of the potential loss of revenue to such State or local government due to the
extreme heat event based on any such previous
event;

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"(3) a description of any other sources of as sistance available to the State or local government,
 including potential sources that are not solely re sponsible for mitigation of extreme heat events; and
 "(4) any potential long-term impacts of the ex treme heat events, including impacts to infrastruc ture.

8 "(d) ESSENTIAL ASSISTANCE.—In providing assist9 ance under this section, the President may use the author10 ity provided under section 403.

11 "(e) HAZARD MITIGATION ASSISTANCE.—Whether or 12 not a major disaster is declared, the President may pro-13 vide hazard mitigation assistance in accordance with sec-14 tion 404 in any area affected by an extreme heat event 15 for which assistance was provided under this section, in-16 cluding—

17 "(f) RULES AND REGULATIONS.—The President
18 shall prescribe such rules and regulations as are necessary
19 to carry out this section, including—

20 "(1) an requirements for an agreement entered
21 into by the State or local government to receive as22 sistance under this section;

23 "(2) a procedure for an appeals process in the
24 case of a denial of assistance requested under this
25 section; and

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"(3) a description of eligible costs for which as sistance may be provided under this section.".

3 (b) DEVELOPMENT OF EXTREME HEAT EVENT 4 THRESHOLD.—Not later than 90 days after the date of 5 enactment of this Act, the Administrator of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, jointly with the Admin-6 7 istrator of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Admin-8 istration and in consultation with the Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, shall develop a 9 threshold for the temperature and duration of a heat event 10 11 to qualify as an extreme heat event under section 431 of 12 the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, as added by this Act. 13
